From the Pastor's Desk

Late one evening, a wise Cherokee leader told his grandson about a battle that goes on inside people. The grandfather said, "My son, the battle is between two wolves inside us all. One is evil. It is anger, envy, jealousy, sorrow, regret, greed, arrogance, self-pity, guilt, resentment, inferiority, lies, false pride, superiority, and ego. The other is good. It is joy, peace, love, hope, serenity, humility, kindness, benevolence, empathy, generosity, truth, compassion, and faith." The boy thought about it for a minute, and then he asked, "Which wolf wins?" The grandfather replied, "The one you feed."

The best spiritual teachers remind us that spiritual maturation takes time, space, and practice. Jesus says that if people are "worried and distracted about many things," [Luke 10:41] then they cannot have the type of faith that he desires. There is so much striving going on these days. So many individuals feel pressure to build platforms, climb ladders, covet attention, make more money, be enough. But to what end?

Not granting ourselves the time and space for spiritual deepening is feeding the wrong wolf. Numb to their soul's longing, many people throw themselves into the race for success which they run through the practices of competition, envy, regret, greed, arrogance, lies, and ego. Rarely do they intend this; it is simply what our culture rewards. The insidious illusion of this race convinces people that they do not have enough, create enough, perform enough, invest enough, consume enough. No matter their accomplishments, they are not enough. Their fear drives them in the pursuit of more.

Psychotherapist Sylvia Boorstein says that when she gets in this state of relentless striving or struggle, she says to herself, "Sweetheart, you are in pain. Relax. Take a breath. Let's pay attention to what is happening. Then we'll figure out what to do." I love her advice. If you find yourself feeding the part of you that isn't kind, compassionate, and peaceful, stop. Relax. Take a breath. And then start again, feeding the best of yourself. Remember, what we feed grows.

Heifer International's mission is to end hunger and poverty while caring for the Earth. Working in 19 countries, including the United States, families are helped and communities become self-reliant by providing a range of livestock, seeds and training. It all began in 1944 with founder, Dan West, a farmer whose deep faith called him to relief work during the Spanish Civil War. He saw firsthand that giving people food was a short-term solution, while gifting livestock to families provides long-term nourishment. Additionally, Heifer donors provide resources and training to help farmers improve the quality of their goods and establish connections to markets.


