From the Pastor's Desk

It was the first Easter. Jesus had been raised from the dead. Some of his followers had seen him and heard him. That afternoon, walking toward Emmaus, Jesus joined two of his followers in conversation. Later, he sat down to eat with them. Not until then, when Jesus broke the bread, did they recognize him. Strangely enough, it was when Jesus did something, that they knew him.

Perhaps it is not strange, after all. Most of us know our Lord most deeply by what he has done for us, and not principally by what he has said to us. Jesus died for us! That is the towering message of the Bible. The Sermon on the Mount and the parables are among the most exalted literature in the world. They are words, however, not deeds. Jesus' death for our transgressions – this is the deed to dwarf all deeds. Because of what happened on the cross, we know that Jesus loves us.

The Lord asks us to be his witnesses. This certainly means that we must use words to tell about him. But it means more. Because we are his followers, we are to reach out to people in love as Jesus did. We human beings are moved more deeply by acts of love than by words of love.

The opportunity for witness lies in the most commonplace situations. Someone is lonely, and we write a letter or make a phone call. Someone has lost a job, and we help him find another. Someone is old and lives alone, and we bring a warm meal. Someone is lied about, and we defend her. Someone is in jail, and we go to visit. You and I are ordinary, everyday people. We remember that Jesus was too. He was a young carpenter from a small town. Yet he was God come to earth. Jesus used all sorts of common, ordinary, everyday places to reveal himself and his love, deeds of mercy which finally brought him to the crowning deed, death for our salvation.

St. Patrick's Day Trivia

St. Patrick's original name was Maewyn Succat and he was born to Christian parents in Roman Britain. His father was a deacon and his grandfather, a priest. We know that he was a Roman citizen, because Britain was Roman then, and then he was enslaved and taken to Ireland, where he either escaped or was released. He then became a priest and went back to Ireland, where he had "a lot of luck converting the Druid culture into Christians." The March 17 celebration started in 1631 when the Church established a Feast Day honoring St. Patrick.
